

UPSC Syllabus: Subjects, Stages & Preparation Guide



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STAGE 1: Preliminary Examination Syllabus

General Studies Paper I (Preliminary Examination):

This paper aims to test candidates' knowledge in various areas of general awareness. This paper discusses the following topics:

1. **Indian History:** Ancient, medieval, and modern history of India, major dynasties, socio-cultural aspects, freedom struggle, etc.

STAGE 2: Main Examination Syllabus
